#### US/ICOMOS Signs on to the <u>African</u> <u>American Burial Grounds Network Act</u>

In honor of Black History Month, Representatives A. Donald McEachin and Alma S. Adams introduced the "<u>African</u> <u>American Burial Grounds Network Act."</u> This legislation would create a voluntary national network of historic African-American burial grounds, and would provide information, technical support, and grants to aid in the research, identification, preservation, and restoration of burial sites within the network.



US/ICOMOS has signed on to support this legislation and we encourage our members to contact their representatives and


### Darius A. Arya, Ph.D.: US/ICOMOS Member and New Media Advocate for Cultural Heritage

All of US/ICOMOS's members and friends recognize the importance of educating a broad international audience about the significance of cultural heritage and its preservation. Meet one of our members who has devoted his life and career to this: Darius A. Arya, Ph.D., an American archaeologist based in Rome who is pioneering new ways of presenting cultural heritage to the world.

A Fellow at the American Academy in Rome, Darius transitioned from excavation to preservation while living and working in the ancient city. Since 2002, Darius has served as Executive Director of the <u>American Institute for Roman Culture</u>, where he has led



programs and projects including collaborating with the Italian Ministry of Culture, <u>Rome</u> <u>Museums</u>, Roma Tourism, and <u>ICCROM</u>. Darius has spent years exploring new ways to present the history and archaeology of the ancient world to new audiences in new ways. One of these educational tools is <u>Ancient Rome Live</u>, a multi-platform learning experience that presents original content in video and live-streaming formats to anyone interested in ancient Rome and its empire. Darius also currently hosts "Under Italy" in Italian on Rai5, Italy's national culture channel, exploring the archaeology of Bologna, Orvieto, Catania, Palermo and other Italian cities.



Americans are most likely to recognize Darius as the archaeological expert and host of numerous documentaries for the Discovery, History, National Geographic and PBS channels. Most recently, Darius guided viewers through three <u>"Ancient Invisible Cities</u>" (Athens, Istanbul and Cairo) on PBS channels in Fall 2018. These entertaining and informative programs introduce a mass audience to current developments in archaeology, including 3D imaging techniques that expose important historical features that lie hidden underground.

In late 2018, Darius was a Guest Scholar at the <u>Getty Conservation Institute</u>, working on "The Role of New Media for Heritage Preservation and Promotion: Successful Storytelling, Best Practices, and Tools for Tangible Results." Related to this study, Darius has recently begun projects addressing heritage travel, sustainability and the roles that indigenous and local peoples play in

#### Introducing Our International Exchange Program (IEP) Hosts: <u>The</u> <u>National Trust of Trinidad and Tobago</u>

Each year, organizations in the United States and all over the world host interns participating in the US/ICOMOS International Exchange Program. This commitment to historic preservation, international cooperation and the future brings big rewards to both intern and host. This month, we feature the National Trust of Trinidad and Tobago (NTTT), a longtime friend of US/ICOMOS and the IEP. NTTT was established in 1991 to protect and promote the preservation of significant examples of Trinidad and Tobago's built and natural heritage, as well as to educate and provide access to these heritage and natural sites.



NTTT not only employs a former IEP intern, Kara Roopsingh (IEP Alum, Nantucket '14), it has hosted interns for many summers, creating compelling projects for the interns to work on. Above right, 2018 intern Mayrelis Perez at the Red House, Trinidad and Tobago's seat of Parliament, which has been undergoing restoration for several years. Mayrelis spent her internship documenting the St. James Police Barracks in Port of Spain, Trinidad and Tobago's capital city, to aid in their listing as a National Heritage Site. She wrote, "I was able to go into archives, reach out to other professionals, and interview individuals whose voices are usually not heard and they all had a lot of unknown information to give me about the project and informed the final nomination. Being able to inform high ranking officials on their history and in a way influencing how they view the work that the National Trust does for Trinidad and Tobago makes me feel like I contributed to the future work they do."

NTTT staff concur: "The US/ICOMOS IEP has been immensely rewarding for the National Trust of Trinidad and Tobago because we have been able to successfully get dossiers from the interns, which now enables us to list (legally protect) properties of interest. Seeing our heritage through the eyes of another professional has also opened up new dialogues and opportunities."

NTT staff understand the professional and personal growth that an international internship offers: "From this experience we hope the interns returned to the United States confident that they can use their skill to contribute to a country very different from their own. We loved the fact that they pitched in and got involved with all our other projects, tours and activities. The staff introduced them to our local culture, cuisine, and island way of life, so we are confident they returned home with an idea of how to be a 'Trini' and a positive exchange experience overall."

The National Trust of Trinidad and Tobago will again host a US/ICOMOS intern in the summer of 2019. We truly appreciate their many years of support!

<u>International Alliance for the Protection of Heritage in</u> <u>Conflict Areas (ALIPH)</u> Announces Grant Opportunities



ALIPH, a new international foundation headquartered in Switzerland, has announced two categories of grants to support initiatives that address the prevention, protection and rehabilitation of cultural heritage threatened or damaged by conflict. One category, which can be submitted at any time, is for grant requests of up to \$75,000 for immediate emergency relief actions. The second category has no minimum or maximum amount but would respond to periodic calls for proposals—with the first call issued on January 15 and **due March 15, 2019.** ALIPH prioritizes concrete projects with direct on-the-ground impact.

#### <u>National Council for Preservation Education (NCPE)</u> Summer 2019 Internships

NCPE, in cooperation with the National Park Service (NPS) and other partnering government agencies, is pleased to offer internships during the summer of 2019. NCPE has partnered with the NPS since 1992 to connect higher education students and recent graduates in historic preservation, cultural resource management, and related fields to projects at a wide variety of sites and divisions within the NPS system and other agencies annually. Approximately 70 internships are available this summer, with another 65 offered in the winter of 2019-2020.
