Webinar: Tribal Reconnection and Archaeological
Discovery: The Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks World
Heritage Nomination

Thursday, March 25, 2021, 3 to 4 pm EDT



Eight vast 2,000-year-old American Indian earthworks in the middle Ohio River Valley constitute the Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks World Heritage nomination. Conceived and designed as ceremonial centers, these immense earthworks are the finest expressions of the cultural flowering and distinctive genius of Indigenous peoples who participated in a social or religious movement that touched much of North America. Learn how two major changes over the past dozen years are transforming understanding and interpretation of these amazing places: first, reconnection of American Indian Tribal nations that were forcibly removed from Ohio in the 19th century, and second, advances in methods of archaeological research and interpretation.

Chief Glenna Wallace of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, National Park Service staff and Ohio History Connection staff will share how the prospect of World Heritage designation is propelling these changes, which in turn fuel a vision for full collaboration and co-management in the near future.

Steve is a Founding Principal of Architectural Resources Group (ARG), whose work encompasses some of the West Coast's most iconic buildings and sites, and has previously served US/ICOMOS as a Trustee, (2000-2009), and Vice Chairman, (2005-2009).



Steve's forty years of leadership at ARG have

involved all aspects of the practice, including planning, conservation, and design for some of the most historically important places in the Western United States. These range from the California Missions to major projects throughout the National Park System and include important civic and institutional work such as Pasadena City Hall and Garrett Hall at the University of Virginia. Steve is actively involved on a number of other boards including, the California State Historical Safety Board which administers the California Historic Building Code, the California Missions Foundation, the Historic Preservation Education Foundation, and the University of California at Berkeley's Design Review Committee.

Steve will serve a 3-year term as Trustee and hopes to contribute to strengthening the US/ICOMOS organization and the U.S. connections to the international preservation community. He is particularly interested in the international issues related to climate change. Thank you for your service, Steve.



Twentieth-Century Historic Thematic Framework Released

Getty Conservation Institute in collaboration with ICOMOS ISC20C (the 20th Century Heritage International Scientific Committee) released "The Twentieth-Century Historic Thematic Framework," a free online tool for architecture and heritage conservation professionals around the world.

Because the 20th century was a time of proliferation of new buildings, cities, and landscapes, the existence of

so many potential heritage places from this period can make it difficult for professionals to determine what is significant and why.



This publication provides a structure to help users identify and assess 20th century heritage, which is often the first step needed to conserve and sustain these places. It identifies the principal social, technological, political, and economic drivers that shaped the 20th century globally, distilled into ten succinct historic themes. <u>Download your copy here</u>.


International Seminar Alert and Call for Papers on Cultural Religious Heritage
